



Storage Export Requirements in Poland

What do you need to know about Poland's import & export regulations?

Understand Poland's import regulations and product standards. Determine the Harmonized System (HS) code to understand tariffs and regulations. Gather necessary export documents: commercial invoice, packing list, certificate of origin, and bill of lading. Verify any tariffs and ensure compliance with Poland's non-tariff measures.

What documents are required for exporting to Poland?

The crucial documents include the export declaration, submitted through Poland's electronic customs system, the commercial invoice, which provides the transaction details, and the bill of lading, ensuring proper transportation documentation.

Do exporters need a customs permit in Poland?

Exporters should consult Poland's official "Import List" to determine if their goods require special permits or are subject to restrictions. The list, plus other helpful information on customs regulations in Poland, can be found in this commercial guide from the U.S. International Trade Administration.

How do I import goods from Poland?

Hire a licensed customs broker to assist with the import process. Ensure products meet local labeling and packaging requirements. File a customs declaration with the Polish Customs Service. Calculate and pay any applicable import duties and taxes. Coordinate with a logistics provider to transport goods to their final destination.

How does customs duty affect import and export activities in Poland?

When engaging in import and export activities in Poland, it is critical for traders to comprehend the various tariffs and taxes that may apply. These financial obligations significantly influence both the cost structure and pricing strategies. One of the central fees is customs duty, which is levied on goods imported into the country.

What documents are required for customs clearance in Poland?

To facilitate clearance under customs regulations in Poland, the following documents must be submitted: Commercial invoice: Details the transaction between exporter and importer, including description, quantity, and value of the goods. Packing list: Provides information on the packaging, including weight and dimensions.
